





- 3 (Back Home Again in) INDIANA what a staunch old warrior! Written in 1917 by Ballard MacDonald and James Hanley to be sung sentimentally by barber's shop quartets, it survives to this day in the repertoire of jazz groups large and small, ancient and modern. In a feature for three clarinets, Karen Sharp has the first solo (and the last laugh), HL and Jimmy Hastings follow.
- SAD, SWEET SONG (1996) was originally an instrumental salute to the great cornettist, Ruby Braff , under the title Song for Ruby. It has since been given lyrics by the composer which, following a precedent established many years ago by Hoagy Carmichael, he delivers himself. Jimmy Hastings plays a fragment of sad, sweet alto before the original instrumental conclusion takes over
- AH, MERSEY! (1987) was couched in an R & B style that was fashionable in the Eighties and has since proved to be timeless, audiences responding to the rocking rhythm with as much enthusiasm today. Belated thanks to the legendary Stax label for the loan of some riffs ! Solos by Ted Beament ,HL, Karen Sharp, Jimmy Hastings and Ray Wordsworth.
- The wistful RUE PARADIS was written by Karen Sharp at HL's behest. She did the arrangement and shares solo space with Ted Beament.

- ORY'S STORY (1976) is a happy calypso based on the harmonies of Kid Ory's Muskrat Ramble. Jimmy Hastings plays the flute, Ted Beament demonstrates his mastery of Latin keyboard rhythms perfected during a long residency in the River Room of the Copacabana Club. Stoke Poges (don't go looking for it), and the composer enjoys himself, vocally and otherwise.
- WE FELL OUT OF LOVE (1975) was sung by Elkie Brooks, at that time a regular guest with the band on stage. Vocal and trumpet here by the song's writer.
- THE LADY OF THE LAVENDER MIST (1981, 1991) has been a feature for three successive alto-players in the band - Bruce Turner, Alan Barnes and now Jimmy Hastings, who puts on it his own tender stamp. Alan Cohen was again the arranger
- 10 With a cursory but grateful nod in the direction of Maurice Ravel and the Spanish dance which he immortalised, BLUES IN BOLERO (1974) is more blues than bolero, though Joe Temperley cried 'Ha, Modal Humph' when he heard it. Solos by HL, Karen Sharp, Jimmy Hastings, Ray Wordsworth and Ted Beament.



- 11 MADLY (1973) took its title from Duke Ellington's valediction 'The kids in the band want you to know they do love you madly'. Originally a countermelody inspired by a hero. British march-composer Kenneth Alford, it's now the main theme for a duet by Karen Sharp and Jimmy Hastings.
- 12 JAIL BREAK (1953) made a somewhat surprising appearance in the HL repertoire, at a time when the band took part in a BBC radio series called Ballads and Blues with leading folk-singers. Over a traditional Southern US worksong theme, our guest, mezzo-soprano Verona Chard. captures the spirit of the lament originally assigned to Iris Grimes.
